#### **ADMINSTRATIVE REPORTS and COMMUNICATIONS**

#### **CITY MANAGER**

The City Manager presented the following legislation requests:

#### 2018-2019 Rock Salt Bid Award

An ordinance to enter into an agreement with Morton Salt, Inc., as the most responsible bid for rock salt for City roads in the amount as follows: \$79.44/ton per dump truck; \$83.44/ton per piler; \$79.00/ton per pick up. Funding for this expense will be taken from the State Highway Fund 206. Mr. Pugliese moved, Mr. Quaranta seconded to approve the request; motion CARRIED. The President reported the cost has doubled. The Manager said last year a dump truck load cost \$32.98. He said he has never seen it this low; that usually it is in the \$55 to \$65 range; and \$79.44 is not the highest he has seen it since his time as City Manager. The Clerk asked why such a large increase. The Manager said last year was a light winter; this year a light winter is predicted; and his guess is the company is forecasting less of a demand, which drives up the price. The Ward 2 Councilor remembers receiving a reimbursement due to being overcharged by a salt company. The Manager said the Ohio Attorney General found collusion between companies; however, the reimbursement was nowhere near what we were robbed of. The size of the municipality does not dictate negotiating power. The motion CARRIED.

An ordinance approving a CRA application for Spring Family Properties, LLC. Ashtabula Area City Schools Board of Education approval has been received. Mr. Quaranta moved, Mr. Roskovics seconded to approve the request. At the request of the Clerk of Council the City Manager presented the following information:

- CRA (Community Reinvestment Area) is also known as a Tax Abatement
- The tax abatement is calculated on the property valuation before and after renovation "the difference being the before and after values, on the tax rolls, will be what is abated"
- Spring Family Properties, LLC., dba Burrito Loco, has requested 75% tax abatement for 10 years

- Their plan is to:
  - Open a Burrito Loco at 2421 Lake Avenue
  - o Spend \$250,000 to renovate the existing structure
  - o Employ 15 persons (combination of full and part time)

# The motion CARRIED.

## Ronyak Paving Change Order No. 1 – 2018 Paving

An ordinance to execute Change Order No. 1 with Ronyak Paving in an amount not to exceed \$61,468.30 for the deletion and addition of work on the 2018 Paving Project. Mr. Pugliese moved, Mr. Quaranta seconded. The Ward 4 Councilor said, "Instead of doing the chip/fog/seal on some of the roads, we're going to upgrade those to full-blown paving, basically to the tune of an extra \$60,000." The Manager responded, "That, plus the addition of a few roads after this was all said and done. And, the deletion of the south side of West Avenue, comes out to an additional \$61,000." The Ward 4 Councilor said, "So, if we were to do just chip/fog/seal on some of those roads, like originally planned, we wouldn't have to spend this money or we could take this money and do extra chip/fog/seal on other roads." The Manager said, "That's correct." The motion CARRIED.

#### **Announcements**

Garbage Pickup: A reminder was issued that pickup will be delayed this week.

**Construction:** Due to the amount of construction taking place throughout the City by the gas company (Walnut Boulevard & West 9<sup>th</sup> Street), the water company (16 inch water line up West Avenue), the City's paving project and the Route 20 paving project; and the intersection of Lake Avenue and Route 20 is going to get "hairy" soon, part of Park Avenue is closed to traffic and City crews are readying for the winter, motorist were asked to exercise extra caution.

## **Curbside Recycling Update**

At the request of the Ward 3 Councilor, the City Manager gave the following update:

- Addresses of the homes that will get bins delivered have been provided.
- We are meeting tomorrow with County representatives and the company that is going to delivering the bins.
- The County has agreed to print educational material to be delivered with the bins.
- Notices are being prepared to send to two small areas in the City whose garbage pickup day is Friday but will be moved to Thursday to efficiently accommodate curbside recycling.
- By the middle of this month or beginning of October, the bins should be delivered and the program should begin.
- The recycling bins placed at the Transfer Station are working well.
- The recycling process will be "single stream", which means recyclables will not have to be separated.

• Recyclables should not be placed in plastic bags because the bags get confused as paper when going through the mills, which then causes contamination.

Monday through Friday Recycling Center drop-off hours are 7:00 a.m. to 2:45 p.m.; Saturday: 8:00 or 9:00 a.m. until Noon.

The Ward 4 Councilor suggested asking Ms. Camille Licate, Kids for Positive Change and area students to help get the word out about recycling.

The City Manager said unfortunately commercial is not yet a part of curbside recycling. There have been discussion about how to put recycling bins at Ashtabula Area City School sites, given funds for recycling are not yet available. Because the City empties the school's commercial containers, it just makes sense to provide recycling bins to lessen the amount of waste going to the landfill.

The City Manager issued a reminder that "RECYCLING DOES NOT MAKE MONEY; IT COSTS MONEY! There was a time; there was a place where recycling did make money; those days are over."

#### Graffiti

The Ward 2 Councilor asked citizens to be on the lookout for spray painters who are defacing property around town, (e.g., bridge on West 24<sup>th</sup> Street and sites along Lake Avenue). The words "Kevin", "2.9" and "Chris", are common words being sprayed. He reported the bridge on East 6<sup>th</sup> Street had to be resprayed shortly after graffiti was removed. The Ashtabula Police Department should be called to make reports. The Manager said the actual paint being used costs over \$900 for a 5 gallon epoxy paint bucket.

The President announced the committee has not met. The Chair announced the committee would like to invite Ashtabula Area City Schools Superintendent, Dr. Mark Potts, to their October 5 or November 2 committee meeting to share District happenings.

# **SAFETY FORCES - (SF)** (Speelman/Harley)

The Chair reported on the committee's Monday, August 27, meeting, as follows:

## **Traffic Control Requests**

East 46<sup>th</sup> and State Road: A request for no parking signs was made because motorists are parking within the prohibited 20 feet from crosswalk area; and therefore are parking too close to the corner. After Police Chief Robert Stell's review, he does not believe additional traffic control measures are required. However, the City will post "No Parking from Here to Corner" signs in the appropriate locations.

Adams Avenue (between West 52<sup>nd</sup> and West 57<sup>th</sup> Streets): The Police Chief continues to look into the request to prohibit parking on one side of the road.

Washington Avenue (between West 57<sup>th</sup> and West 58<sup>th</sup> Streets): Mr. Speelman moved, Ms. Haines seconded to officially ask the City Manager and Police Department to study the request to prohibit parking on the east side of the road and make recommendation for Council's consideration. The Clerk noted parking is now prohibited on the west side and that Mr. Joey Brobst, owner of Brobst Landscaping, said they have a difficult time getting their large trucks in and out of their gated area. The Chair said whatever the Police Chief deems appropriate will be considered. The motion CARRIED.

## **Police Department Update**

- Body Cameras are in; technical issues are being worked out; once worked out the officers will be trained and start begin them
- Radio software updates have been performed
- The Police Levy Renewal Committee has been formed "from the Police Department". They are waiting to have a meeting with America Votes, an organization who conducts studies to determine which areas in the City should be targeted during the renewal campaign.
- Police Levy Facts
  - o Currently the funds pay for 5 police officers and 2 dispatchers.
  - o This represents 20% of the Police Department.
  - o If the levy does not pass, the department staff will be reduced by 20%.
  - o For the month of July there were 1757 Calls for Service, which breaks down to 58 calls per day and a little more than 2.5 calls per hour.
  - O These are calls into the dispatch center, which then causes a police vehicle to be dispatched for anything from loud music to violate crimes. This is with four (4) patrolmen on the road at a time.
  - o The work does not decrease if the levy fails.
- A criminal reporting resource brochure has been created. The Manager had 1000 printed.
   Members of City Council will receive some, and some will be available at various events and gatherings in the City.
